
Children will be served dinner. They can take part in Halloween crafts, such as decorating pumpkins and more. They must be in kindergarten through eighth grade to attend.



'Spring Awakening' to open next week




Rehearsals begin Jan. 14 for non-Equity performers, and Jan. 21 for Equity performers.


CReATE Studio is hosting the What Makes a House a Home Art Show & Auction.
